Introduction

Hong Kong is a Special Administrative Region (SAR), located on the southeast of China. Despite its urban density, around 40% of its total land area is actually protected within the boundaries of 24 country parks. As such, apart from the bustling city atmosphere, there are also extensive opportunities for outdoor recreational activities.

Hong Kong's current uniqueness stems from the British colonial history and role as a major global financial hub. Hong Kong attracts foreign investors through its free-market policies, low taxation, and minimal government intervention in the market. With a highly developed financial sector, it successfully emerged as one of the world's leading international financial centres. Apart from the Hong Kong Stock Exchange being one of the largest in the world, the city is also a significant hub for trade, with its port among the busiest globally. The GDP of Hong Kong was at US\$365.5 billion in 2023.

Hong Kong's population currently stands over 7.49 million as of May 2024 while the average temperature ranges around 20 to 29°C throughout the year.

Culture



Hong Kong's culture encapsulates a vibrant fusion of both Chinese heritage and British colonial legacies, enriched by a global outlook. As such, the city not only celebrates Chinese traditional festivals but also adapts to Western customs and education system that is blended with the city's current practices. This East-West fusion is also reflected in Hong Kong's bilingualism, with both Cantonese and English widely spoken.

History



Hong Kong's currently a Special Administrative Region (SAR) where certain freedoms of the city is retained. Previously, Hong Kong island was ceded to the British Empire after the First Opium War in 1842. After the Second Opium War, China was also forced to cede Kowloon in 1860, the area on the mainland opposite Hong Kong island.

Afterwards, Hong Kong remained under the British colony until 1 July 1997, where the sovereignty was handed over back to China, ending the 156 years of ruling by the British. However, Hong Kong still enjoys a high degree of autonomy, except in foreign and defence affairs for the next 50 years under the principle of "one country, two systems".

Cuisine



In Hong Kong, Cantonese cuisine dominates the city, featuring a plethora of dishes such as dim sum, roasted meats, and polo buns. The city is also famous for its street food, including curry fish balls, meat skewers, and beef offal. British colonial influence is also heavily present, seen in many dishes like Hong Kong style baked pork chop rice and milk tea.

Hence, the city's dining scene ranges from humble street food stalls to Michelin-starred restaurants, offering a variety of cuisines for both the locals and non-locals to enjoy.

Hong Kong is a Special Administrative Region (SAR) located Southeast of China. It consists of four main regions - Hong Kong Island, Kowloon, New Territories, and Lantau Island.

Due to its size, the city is conveniently connected through both public and private transportation. This makes it an ease to explore and enjoy what the city has to offer. Shenzhen, China is also located at the North of the city, making it a popular place for a weekend getaway.

The Hong Kong Mass Transit Railway (MTR) is the rapid transit system for Hong Kong. The system opened on 1 October 1979.

The city currently offers 11 metro lines, making the city conveniently accessible through public transportation. Key lines include the Island Line, Tsuen Wan Line, and the East Rail Line, connecting major urban areas and business districts. On the other hand, the Airport Express line provides a rapid link to Hong Kong International Airport, where the 35.3km journey between the airport and the city takes as little as 24 minutes. As such, the MTR is an essential component of Hong Kong's public transportation system.

Taxi

In Hong Kong, taxis are readily available and can be flagged down on most streets.

However, there are three types of taxis:

- Urban Taxis (Red)
- New Territories Taxis (Green)
- Lantau Taxis (Blue)

The different coloured taxis operates at different regions of Singapore. In detail, the red ones operate throughout most of Hong Kong, including Hong Kong Island, Kowloon, and parts of the New Territories; while the green and blue operates mainly in the New Territories and serve Lantau Island, including the airport and Disneyland, respectively.

Alternatively, passengers can use popular and reliable taxi-hailing online apps such as Uber, HKTaxi and the Didi app, which all offers affordable car rides.




Housing



Given the city's dense population and limited land area, housing in Hong Kong are mostly high-rise apartments where units ranging from luxurious complexes to small subdivided spaces. Regions such as the southern part of Hong Kong Island or Kowloon Peninsula, where there is more space and good schools, are favoured. Many would also consider location of work to avoid long period of commute.


